

Choosing Youth Apprenticeship Related Instruction



Purpose of Related Instruction

Students must enroll in **1 High School Credit or 3 College Credits** of related coursework for each year that you participate in Youth Apprenticeship. This course is meant to ensure that students acquire the technical and academic skills necessary to be successful in the placement and support work tasks. This should occur in the same year as the YA placement to connect learning competencies with work.

Choosing Related Instruction

Collaborate with your YA Coordinator and School Counselor to select the best option for related instruction. Ideally, choose a high school course within your career pathway that offers dual credit and is directly related to your YA placement. If no such course is available, you may take a high school course in the same career cluster; a related college course through the Start College Now Program (Technical College) or Early College Credit (4 year college), or a course in the career pathway from an alternative provider like Destinations Career Academy. Suggested courses are provided but not exhaustive. While some non-CTE courses are allowed, CTE courses that support Youth Apprenticeship skills are preferred. If you're choosing a Start College Now technical college course (March 1 for Fall; October 1 for Spring) or Early College Credit course (March 1 for Fall; October 1 for Spring or February 1 for Summer), be aware of the registration deadlines.
